Over-The-Counter (OTC) Pain Medication

Acetaminophen and ibuprofen are used to reduce pain, inflammation, and fever.

Your healthcare provider may recommend you use both of them for additional relief. To do this best, alternate the medications every 3 or 4 hours. That way, when one starts to wear off, the other one is kicking in.

It takes about 30 minutes - 1 hour for most oral medications to take effect.

Check with a provider before taking acetaminophen or ibuprofen if you take other prescription medications or have any chronic health conditions.

Note: For a **cheaper alternative to brand-name medications**, purchase the generic medication sold by the store. Be sure to **always read the Drug Facts and directions** to check that it contains the same active ingredient(s) and instructions.

"OTC" means no prescription is needed and they can be obtained at most pharmacies.
